Core Values, Mission and Vision

We all know this familiar song....by The Who

Who are you?
Who, who, who, who?
I Really Want to Know!



But did you know that this song applies to your chorus?

YES, it does, according to Harriette Walters, Master Director of the Greater Nassau Chorus who presented two workshops for Directors and Faculty in Region 6, July 28, and August 8.

Clarifying your chorus Mission, Core Values, and a Vision is critical to marketing your chorus, attracting new members, growing, and developing your chorus.

Harriette explained the journey Greater Nassau Chorus made to identify their Mission, Core Values and Vision to guide their decision-making, direction, and culture. Doing this work helped Great Nassau Chorus break through a performance plateau to more fun, more focus and higher contest scores.

What are Core Values?

Core values are the basic principles that the chorus has chosen to guide their actions. They are the foundation on which the vision rests.

Core values:

- Define beliefs, standards, and acceptable behaviors.
- Guide and govern the decisions and actions of individuals and the organization.
- Shape the organizational culture and the behavior and actions of all who are associated with that organization.
- Provide the framework for decisions, priorities, and actions.

Every chorus has it is own version of Core Values depending on their members and their culture. Core Values describe what your chorus believes in.

Once Core Values were defined, it became easier to define the Mission – what services or product the chorus delivers to members, audiences, and the community.

With clear Core Values and a Mission statement, identifying a Vision of the future is the next step. A vision is a statement of aspiration. It is a picture of the future you hope to build and realize. A vision is different from a goal.

Defining "Who are you?" with Core Values, Mission and Vision, makes it possible to clearly explain your chorus to guests and potential members, new audiences, donors and supporters, grant makers, organizations and individuals who may hire you.

Core Values, Mission and Vision are powerful tools to focus and grow your chorus.


You will even get ideas for virtual games and themes. Bonnie Rust has been working on revising various manuals to help guide the faculty in their work as a faculty member.

Things I've Learned About Singing

After many months of not singing in our choruses, many

singers are concerned about diminishing vocal health/vocal quality. I've started a project that I can work with until we can be together again.

- 1. Posture
- 2. Sing in that "ah-ha" space
- 3. Breath higher, esp. at key changes
- 4. Keep tongue flat behind bottom teeth
- 5. Raise cheek bones
- 6. Lift eyebrows
- 7. Open throat
- 8. Sing North and South
- 9. Sing above the equator
- 10. Raise your upper jaw
- 11. Sing in the mask
- 12. Breath in the vowel space
- 13. Sing forward
- 14. Use more air behind sound
- 15. Don't raise or lower chin
- 16. Sing with a long back of the neck
- 17. Sing behind your upper front teeth
- 18. Always know where "Do" is in your music
- 19. Open as if you are going to yawn. Beginning of a yawn
- 20. Big steps going up the scale, small steps going down
- 21. Again.....Posture



Think of things you've learned and add them to this list. Different ways of saying things means different things to many.

Copy this and keep it out where you can refer to it often, while you practice your music at home in quarantine.

These are just a few of the things that we've learned about singing.

How Often Should I Practice?

My voice teacher once sent me a cute flyer with an answer to that question and I quote: "You only need to practice on the days that you eat." Why practice, you say, with no rehearsal, performances or



contests? All the more reason to keep singing and working on your technique thus causing it to become automatic so as to enable you to be free as a performer and ready to share the joy of our craft and your gift of song when we return.


It has been said "The art of singing is the art of breathing". Work on it! Do snuff breathing and hum as you work while cooking, loading the dishwasher or ironing. Sing while you are going for your walk or driving to the store. Going up the stairs? Sing when you reach the top! All singing takes energy so continue to move.

Experiment with your voice trying different colors and textures. Read a children's book out loud with lots of air using your head voice or chest voice. Mix the registers. Sing pop, country, opera, broadway belt, children's songs. If you play the piano or an instrument, you practice. Your voice is your instrument so DO practice. SMILE and above all, **keep singing on the days that you eat!**

Our website, and the HarmonySite server that hosts us, are under constant attack by hackers, who are looking to crack our defenses and take control of our website, to use it for nefarious purposes. Our website may get about 30 attacks per day.

Fortunately, HarmonySite has implemented security measures to protect us against hackers so that they <u>never</u> get in. Recently, HarmonySite beefed up that security even more.

Because of this, it's possible (although unlikely) that the intrusion-detection system will occasionally block a legitimate user of the system. If that happens to you, you will be unable to connect to our website. Instead you will see your web-browser waiting, waiting, waiting for about 20 seconds, and then giving up, saying that a connection to the website could not be established. If that happens, please contact us and we will have HarmonySite unblock you.

Song Assessment Tool

Summary of a message sent by Joan Boutilier Sweet Adelines International President

Sweet Adelines International Board of Directors has denounced songs with racist lyrics, messages, or histories. In August, they provided a Song Assessment Tool to help identify songs with those characteristics. The tool provides a consistent set of questions to guide members through the assessment of a song based on factors driven by SAI's Guiding Principles of Diversity and Inclusion and a Culture of Belonging.

New competition rules include disqualification for the performance of songs with racist lyrics, messages, and histories.

Members will assess a song by working through a series of questions that lead them through step-by-step research about the song. Once their assessment is complete, they will submit the song and it will be added to an assessment database.



A Song Assessment Tool Committee will review the submission and determine if the research is accurate and thorough, then confirm whether the research indicates the song has racist lyrics, message, or histories. The committee will answer the question 'is this song admissible for performance or presentation by Sweet Adelines?' with a 'yes' or 'no' and provide that answer back to the submitter, and save all rated submissions with the supporting research to a <u>database</u> shared with all Sweet Adelines (member login is required).

A rating of 'admissible' does not indicate whether a song is suitable for a performer, nor its strength as a barbershop arrangement for contest.

SAI is asking members to begin with submission of their competition songs. Starting with regional competition 2021, the competition registration process will include an indication that the competitor has verified the organizational rating of each competition song. A team of resource people is available to walk members through their first efforts with the Song Assessment Tool if they need some help. A new email mailbox,

songassessment@sweetadelines.com, is specifically dedicated to the Song Assessment Tool.

Educational materials, including recorded video walk-throughs of the Song Assessment Tool, a list of reliable research resources, tips and tricks for researching songs, and an evolving set of frequently asked questions are available on the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion web page on the Sweet Adelines International website.

- **All members**, plus non-member Directors, can enroll in DCP.
- You can gather on Zoom with other Region 6 DCP applicants.
- DCP allows remote testing (we use Zoom).
- We have Certified Directors willing and able to be your mentor.
- Frontline Directors and Assistant/Associate Directors can become Certified; the rest of us can reach Approved status.
- Frontline Directors must have directed the chorus for at least a year, plus be Certified, before he/she can earn Harmony 500 or Master Director awards in Regional/International contests.

Terri Calvert - Education Coordinator and Megan Argall - Director Coordinator & I hosted our first DCP Zoom gathering on August 16th. Attendees were DCP applicants who found it helpful in answering various question about the program, including the new remote testing process. We're looking to have the next Zoom meeting later in September; applicants watch for an email & best of luck to all of you!

April Horne Honored

Press release from the Southeast District of the American Choral Directors Association of Minnesota



On Thursday, August 13, 2020, April Horne was presented with ACDA Southeast District's Advocate for Choral Excellence (ACE) Award by district chair, Michael Jeffrey.

Horne was nominated by Nikita Albrecht, formerly of Dover-Eyota Schools. In her nomination, Albrecht commented on Horne's incredible dedication and support of choral music in Southeast Minnesota:

"I would like to nominate April Horne for the ACE award. She used to have children that were in choir at Dover-Eyota, and for the past several years...she put together the Southeast Minnesota A Cappella Festival which started at DE, became an annual event that traveled around the schools in SEMN, and ended up for the past 3 or 4 years at the

Mayo Civic Center because it got too big for high schools to accommodate. She had choral groups from around the world come and share educational workshops and performances with the...choirs involved, and had college choirs collaborate and perform as well. This was done along with the National Alliance on Mental Illness so some proceeds went to NAMI as well each year. Acts she was able to bring for our students to witness include Cantus, Six Appeal (many times), Great Northern Union, and then some....She also sings female barbershop...and she coordinated a summer workshop each year for girls interested in singing barbershop. She attends and supports many choral events in the area from high school concerts and musicals to professional performances and keeps choir directors in the area in the loop about choral events that might interest them."

Jeffrey attests to the influence Horne has had on choral music in Southeast Minnesota as well:

"The Southeast Minnesota A Cappella Festival is a major event in our district, with wide participation. I have many students who have participated in one way or another and absolutely loved it. It is one of the major events that choir directors in this corner of the state talk about. April has done an incredible job building this event and making it a success."

Additionally, Horne is on the board for Sing Out Loud, sings with the Zumbro Valley Chorus Sweet Adelines, and travels to schools with a quartet to share the joy of barbershop with students. She loves music and believes in supporting and sharing that joy with others, which is why she does such significant work supporting choral music and why she is so deserving of the Advocate for Choral Excellence Award.

A final survey of the young women showed that it was a very positive experience. They appreciated being able to sing "with" a group and enjoyed learning barbershop music. They liked the mix of songs and enjoyed being able to make decisions about costumes, choreography, and final video editing, including the addition of images representing their dreams in the video for "Million Dreams."

Since the date for submitting this article preceded the concert date (August 25th) we're not able to provide feedback from our audience, but they were very excited and grateful to be part of this premier event. We appreciate that they allowed us to replicate the capstone concert experience as closely as possible.

Spirit of Harmony

SPIRIT OF HARMONY CHORUS CELEBRATES 40 YEARS

The Spirit of Harmony Chorus, which has grown from a chorus of new-to-barbershop singers to a chorus who has competed internationally 4 times, is celebrating its 40th anniversary this year.

Spirit of Harmony began meeting at St. Mary's Catholic Church in Spirit Lake in October 1979 with 31 women present. The group was chartered with the Sweet Adelines International organization in May 1980 under the direction of Ken VanderSloot. Their first regional competition was in March 1981 in Iowa City. The next year they competed in Ames and won the Most Improved Chorus award winning 8th place. Judy Weipert was their director from 1982 to 1984. In 1984 Jane Ford served as director until 1999. Judy again took over the director spot in 1999 and still is the director of Spirit of Harmony Chorus.

The chorus never looked back and continued to grow in strength and ability, all while building lasting friendships and just having a great time singing a cappella music with each other. From 1988 to 2019 Spirit of Harmony has won First Place Small Chorus 25 times; Second Place

Overall Chorus 6 times; Third Place Overall Chorus 8 times; Most Improved Chorus 3 times with a total of 49 winning medals at the regional level.

Harmony Classic is an international competition for small and medium size choruses. The small choruses have 30 members or less and medium choruses, 31 to 59 members. To be chosen to compete at the international Harmony Classic, a chorus must have one of the 5th highest scores in the world, in their division, from their regional competition. The top five choruses in each division are invited to attend the Harmony Classic. With hundreds of choruses in those 2 divisions around the world, to place in the top 5 is quite an accomplishment. Spirit of Harmony, from the small chorus division, has competed at the international Harmony Classic four times. They placed 5th in Greenville, SC in 2007; 4th in San Antonio, TX in 2009; 3rd in Houston, TX in 2011 and 5th in Baltimore, MD in 2014. In 2019 Spirit of Harmony qualified with their highest score ever and was invited to the International Competition in Louisville, KY this October, but the competition was cancelled due to the COVID-19 virus. They hope to be able to compete in St. Louis, MO in 2021.

Presently the chorus has 33 members. Along with competing, they also enjoy entertaining a variety of groups. They have consistently sung at The Okoboji Summer Theatre prior to theatre



performances, performed at the Clay County Fair and at various town celebrations, reunions, business gatherings and many other places. They love to entertain their audiences! Members come from Arnolds Park, Emmetsburg, Estherville, Lake Park, Milford, Spirit Lake, Spencer, Battle Creek, Wallingford and Lakefield and Marshall, MN.

In a normal year the chorus meets on Monday nights at 7:00 at Immanuel Lutheran Church in Spirit Lake. Any woman who enjoys singing has been invited to join them at a rehearsal to join in the fun and learning. However, during this time of COVID-19 their rehearsals have taken a different turn. "Rehearsals" are still on Mondays at 7:00, but right now are in the form of ZOOM. This has been a time for members to greet each other, participate in physical and vocal warmups, or perhaps play a musical game. They sing through their current repertoire along with new music by using chorus recordings and learning tracks. They do an old-fashioned roll

call, (remember grade school?), but this is different. We share something a little different each week. One week may be our favorite piece of jewelry, the next might be the top 40 song the year we graduated. They get to know a little something about members they wouldn't necessarily learn while on the risers. They would love to have you join them at a ZOOM rehearsal. To join the chorus at a rehearsal, just email our ZOOM coordinator at lrubis@q.com and she will get the ZOOM login information to you.
